Comments from Ross--Restoring files: By now we are all backing up our documents and pictures to either an external drive or a cloudbased service, right? But have you ever tested your backup to see if you can restore a file? If the answer is no, then I suggest you take a minute to learn how to restore a file from your backup drive.If you're using Windows Backup, tap the start button, type restore files, look for the file you want to restore, click Restore.lf you're using Cobian, click File Explorer (yellow file folder on task bar), double click your external drive, find the file you want to restore, and drag it to your documents folder. If you're using a cloud-based service such as OneDrive, open your browser and log into your OneDrive account, choose the Recycle bin, find the file you want to restore and click Restore. Consult Google for instructions on how to restore files using whatever backup method you're using. Don't assume your backup software is working, test it.
